# The WFL DRUM CORPS MANUAL

WFL DRUM CORPS MANUAL

Of all the arts developed by man, music is by far the most expressive and inspiring. A poet once said: "Where there is song, there you may rest thee—bad people have no song."

Self-expression in music should be encouraged by young and old. There is nothing quite as alluring in musical expression and action as the modern

drum and bugle corps.

Music is composed of two prime elements—melody and rhythm. Without rhythm, there can be no music. Even the song of the bird has rhythm. In the modern corps the drums are the principal instruments of rhythm. They are instruments of action. A mother's lullaby is soothing but the beat of a drum is action! In the modern corps the piston (valve) bugle supplies the melody, and the drums the beat of action. The spirit and pep is in the percussion section which is the heart-beat of the corps.

#### ORGANIZATION

In every community, there are organizations of men and women banded together in the form of clubs, social groups, fraternal organizations, veterans, service men and women, also schools for the purpose of fellowship and the promotion of music in the community. Such groups attain their greatest success by a popular activity that appeals to the great number, both in and outside of their immediate circles. As a means of crystalizing this unity, the organization of a drum and bugle corps is ideal because it is a popular activity for its members, and those who may become affiliated.

A drum and bugle corps, aside from serving its own organization, can be of invaluable service to its community by various turn-outs on many local and national occasions thus furthering civic pride and the American spirit of cooperation.

MANAGEMENT

In the forming of a corps, the first step is of course an inventory of personnel available. Previous experience is a help but not absolutely essential.

There is generally a prime mover—the one who sponsored the idea. This man selects the first committee the so-called organizing committee who at the first meeting elects officers which may be the following: Corps Commander; Vice-Commander; Secretary-Treasurer; and Master-at-Arms. Or officers may be designated as President; Vice-President; Secretary-Treasurer; and Custodian of Equipment.

The first set of officers may be temporary to give opportunity for all members (who are at this first meeting hand-picked for their qualifications) to vote on a permanent set for a term of say one year. Having selected permanent officers, you may appoint a Ways and Means committee to consult with the officers to get the corps underway. This committee together with the officers will draw up a simple set of by-laws, and arrange for methods of instruction, time and place of rehearsals, etc. This is generally the time to pledge members to regular attendance.

#### RAISING OF FUNDS

The raising of funds is comparatively not a difficult task. Plans vary according to community and local conditions. It may be any or all of the following: private contributions by individuals or firms; socials; dances; picnics; bingo games; raffles; carnivals; parking lot concessions at baseball or football games; ladies aid or ladies auxiliary holding teas; card parties; etc. There is always the possibility of prizes and contests or other civic functions.

The most successful money-raiser seems to be automobile raffles. Also, prize money can be secured in marching, playing, and drill contests.


