DCI Judging Criteria

Drum Corps International's member corps create the judging system and every two years judging is analyzed and appropriate changes are made. What might seem obvious on the surface may be masked by the complexity of DCI's judging system, which combines the creativity of a corps' program and the outstanding performers who bring the show to life. There is a maximum of 100 points based on the following criteria and number of points awarded in six categories by eight judges.

General Effect (two judges, 20 points each). One judges music, the other visual. They evaluate what the show is offering intellectually, aesthetically and emotionally and respond to what the show actually is accomplishing.

Music Analysis (one judge for music, one judge for visual, 20 points each). These are the most classically trained adjudicators as well as the most scientific in determining how well the music and visual components fit together into a seemless, unified composition.

Visual Proficiency (one judge, 20 points halved before final score). This field judge looks at small groups and individuals, trying not to focus on any particular performer (used to be referred to as Field Visual and earlier, Marching and Maneuvering).

Color Guard (one judge, 20 points halved before final score). This press box judge analyzes what the guard is doing in relation to the music and how well they are doing it.

Brass (one judge, 20 points halved before final score). This individual judges the quality, balance and complexity of the brass section.

Ensemble Percussion (one judge, 20 points halved before final score). This individual in the press box or in the stands determines how well the front ensemble and field battery blend together.



Maybe You Didn't Know That...

the Seattle Cascades is entering its 51st year of existence.

the current corps evolved from three previous organizations, which included the Greenwood Boys Club Drum and Bugle Corps (1958), Thunderbird Drum and Bugle Corps (1961) and Cascades Cadets (1966), before becoming the Seattle Cascades Drum and Bugle Corps in 1972.

the Cascades began under the leadership of Seattle middle school principal Roderick Stubbs, who continued as director for nearly 40 years.

the corps used to perform on brass instruments with fewer than three valves, which severely limited the chromatic notes that could be played.

before the front ensemble, all percussion instruments had to be carried and performed on by marching members.

the drum corps' principal form of fund raising was from bingo, initially at the Greenlake VFW, which became a sponsor.

the Cascades have earned three national championships—1976 American Legion Color Guard and 1982 VFW Color Guard and 2000 DCI Division III.

the organization has had three uniform color changes from red, white and blue to green, white, silver and black to the current blue, gray and white.

the Cascades made the fastest rise through the DCI ranks in history—2000 Division III World Champions, 2001 Division II Silver Medalist and 2002 Division I (now World Class) finalist with its all-Leonard Bernstein show "City Riffs".

in 2002 the Cascades received the Spirit of Disney Award, which is given to the corps with the most entertaining family oriented show.

the Seattle Cascades is the only corps from the Pacific Northwest to achieve the status of DCI World Class finalist.

the organization was inactive twice in its history, 1997 and 2008, and has come back stronger than ever fielding the largest and most competitive corps since 2002.

the 2017 Cascades has members from 22 states and Canada.

the Cascades are the most traveled corps in the country, often covering 10,000 -16,000 miles and 25 states in a season.

the corps regularly performs in three NFL stadiums but over the years has performed in six.

more than 5,000 young men and women have graduated from the ranks of the Seattle Cascades.

How "Imagine" Became the Corps Song

In 1996, the Cascades performed a show based on music by the Beatles. John Lennon's "Imagine" was the final musical selection that year. The corps hit a rough time with growth and organizational issues and became inactive the following year. In 1998 the Cascades began competing nationally again and it was time to instill new traditions that would have meaning for the thousands of Cascades members yet to come. Then Executive Director Sal Leone told the corps and staff, "Imagine life without the Cascades, imagine the friends that wouldn't have been made, imagine what would happen if we all made a contribution to the world, imagine all the music yet to be played!" With those words and the meaning behind them, "Imagine" by the Beatles became the corps song.
