The news this month involves the Associ ation and Commission meeting, the Mid-winter Contest (see the Score Board), new corps, and Frank Arsenault's second visit to the area.

Russ Bell mentioned that he didn't realize there was so much activity in this area, so did Harvey Berish from New York and Cadence Magazine. Frankly, some of us hadn't realized it either. In addition to the 7 Senior and 5 Junior Assoc. members or near-members, ten more bona fide Drum & Bugle Corps have been contacted recently; all active to some degree. Some are in Oregon and Capada. (RITA and RAY NICHOLAS should appreciate this) For a while I could see possible trouble brewing. Quite a number of Scotch drummers and quartets registered for the contest and played. How do you judge Scotch drumming and standard rudimental in the same contest? The junior Scotch were beginners, so, no problem there, but the seniors were experienced and qualified. Luckily, FRANK ARSENAULT had several medals in his briefcase and we made two separate contests, and I believe the day was saved. The Scotch quartet played very well together, excellent rhythm and expression and Scotch execution. They took 1st handily. Surprisingly, the Scotch drummers did not object to judges ignorant of their style, but I feel it was unfair of Dick Wilson and myself to judge an execution of drumming of which we know practically nothing. FRANK ARSENAULT's visit was very much appreciated, and inspirational to many of the boys who brought Frankie's record jacket for autographing. Frank played a fine exhibition solo and we wished there was more time for a clinic. The T-Birds and Hurricanes gave intermission exhibitions and Frank commented that they sound much better than they did two years ago. This writer also played a snare solo.

On March 12th the Wash, State D & B Corps Assoc. and the Drum Corps Commission held a meeting at Convention City, Wenatchee. It appears that six seniors and three juniors will compete. Housing will

The Northwest Corps-ner (continued) be tough, may resort to dormitory style. Registration fee will be \$2.00 per person instead of \$1.00. First, 2nd, and 3rd place trophies will be awarded. Medals will be awarded each member of the first place corps. Timing judges will wear a refereestyle striped shirt, to be seen. Twirling majors will be excluded from the corps competition. Color guard contest will be conducted. The Assoc, will present flags to the top scoring senior and junior corps of the year. Scores in all competitions will be additive, for the entire season. At the State Legion contest the number of individuals will not be limited. Six M & M competitions for the year were announced. Chuck Johnson gave a speech on the 1962 Century 21 contest. Newest horn player to join is Andy Jones from the Marines D & B corps. Bob Aklin is to be the new major. We hope he also keeps on drumming and turns out for the state individuals. This corps will also play "Battle Hymn". (No one is playing "Exodus"). The unit needs another tenor drummer and a bass drummer. April starts outside field work . . . THE BLACK HAWKS of AU-BURN are back to rehearsing on Sundays and spirit is high here too. Morrison tells me that Randall has nearly joined and Otis may show in June. With some modern touches to this drum line they would be hard to beat. Bob Powers should start the outside work in April, also. THE COLUM-BIANS of PASCO have lost a few members. Ours was quite successful during the Midwinter, so good luck to you and the SOUTHERNAIRS . . . Charlie Fisher from the Air Force Academy sent a tape of drumming by the Academy D & B Corps. It isn't worn out yet, but it is sure being played. Wonderful drumming.
