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

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SMOGLAND STREETBEATS

After the mess I made of last month's column I am not too sure that I should start this one.

I think that there are a few points about the State Legion contest that I should mention this month before going on to this month's news.

In the color guard contest one of the most important rules as to the use of the American flag was violated. Three groups used the flag at the end of their drill by bowing to the stands. One senior guard used the flag in a little drill as they left the field. They could not be judged as they were off the field, but that is no reason to show disregard for the Colors. It seems to me that any group that is out to display the flag of the United States of America should be aware of the rules regarding its proper handling.

As for the drum corps contest, there are only a few small points I may make. One is the large point spread between two judges in the same caption. It seems a little strange that one judge should find seven men out of step and the other marching judge should not find any. There were point spreads of as much as six and seven points between bugle scores. I know that these things can happen, but I question the ability of some of our judges.

The show itself was run very well ... up to the retreat. When the corps were called out onto the field, the announcer kept trying to hurry them along. The first corps had no more than begun to come on the field when he called the next one: This caused a great deal of confusion. The second did not want to start playing while the first corps was still playing. After all of the corps were on the field, the scores were read. They were read so fast that half

of the people did not hear them.

Next, and last, we have the parade. Just picture this and draw your own conclusion. I was standing on the street corner by the judges' stand when I saw an A.A. judge talking to a group of drum corps guys. I went over and started to talk to him when all of a sudden he asked me who had just marched by. I told him it was 'so and so', a band. He then said thank you and marked something down on a sheet of paper. Just because I am nosing around for news I asked him what he was doing. "I'm judging the parade", he said to me. I looked at him and said, "How can you judge without watching them?" His reply to me was as follows, word for word. "I have seen them before, I know what they can do." Boy, with judges like that, who says California doesn't have a real big problem!

Onward we go to the Fourth of July parade held in Huntington Beach. I am not sure whether there were any prizes for this parade or not but there were a lot of drum corps there in the spirit of the holiday. In attendance for this noon turnout were the Imperials, Maryknoll Girls, Lakewood Ambassadors, and Monterey Park Girls. There may have been more but being a playing member of the Imperials it was

The new concert number has given the corps an edge in G.E. and has helped them win three first places in three competitions in 1962; the 4th of July Competition in Everett, the Music in Motion Competition in Seattle and the Hi-Yu contest in West Seattle. The corps copped 2nd prize in the Grand Seafair parade in Seattle. The Hurricanes will try for their third consecutive State title in August. Bob Ackland has replaced Gordy Gould as drum major and has done an outstanding job.

The newest member is majorette Jeanne Kelly, 16 years old, and a veteran of ten years of twirling. Jeanne has won 64 trophies to date including the 1958 Jr. State championship and the 1961 U.S. Twirling Association title in her class.

A unique claim to fame for the Hurricanes is the fact that four brothers are members of the corps . . . whose names are Tom, Dick, Harry, and Larry, Richardson.

A line sound and a very large horn line made them look very good. Third in line were the Flashing Lassies from Monterey Park. They sounded very good and looked like they were very proud to be the second

July 23 saw a large parade in Long Beach, California to celebrate the International Beauty contest that is now going on in that city. There were three drum corps in this parade. The first corps was the Lakewood Ambassadors. At first glance they looked the same, but a closer look showed that over half of the playing members were from the Japanese Boy Scouts Corps in L.A. It looked as though there were more people filling in than there were original men from the corps. Second in line were the L.A. Chinese Drum Corps.





July was the month of competition in Washington. Even with the cancellation of shows were definitely successful. The scores are listed on the Score Board.

The first show of the year was the very popular July 4th contest in Everett, sponsored by the BLUE KNIGHTS. As usual, the stands were packed with 10,000. The Hurricanes and Thunderbirds displayed some Eastern style dancing buglers and cymbal playing drummers. (Drumming on cymbals was started, in Washington, by Pasco). The audience applause showed that they were very much impressed. This month's Northwest picture shows the Hurricanes during their concert. The Hurkies copped first mainly due to their G.E. efforts. The Blue Knights, as usual, performed nicely but lacked fire. The Thunderbirds won first handily with nice G.E. and music. The Shamrocks, while doing a nice job, need more polish and precision.

The second show of the month, spon-sored by the SHAMROCKS, was essentially a repeat of the Everett show. The crowd was considerably smaller, in Seattle, with about 500 viewing the contest. The final standings were a repeat of Everett. The Hurricanes definitely put on the best performance of the night, actually their best of the year. Again Everett per-formed nicely but lacked fire and wallop or anything approaching a show stopper. The Thunderbirds scored well but were still plagued with marching problems. The Shamrocks did a nice job but lacked that wallop that makes a standout corps. Two corps again failed to show for the contests, the Renton Eagles and the Auburn Black Hawks.

The PASCO COLUMBIANS contest at Pasco was a sort of double competition. One contest between the top two and one contest between the next three corps. A fine spirited rivalry has developed between the Columbians and Thunderbirds. The Pasco unit had easily ruled the junior division for four years but the T-Birds have been climbing steadily, at a faster pace than the Columbians have continued to climb. Finally, after three years, the Thun-derbirds topped the Pasco boys. The Shamrocks bested the two Oregon corps with a neat performance. The Hawthorne Hawks looked good as did the Athena Falcons.
We hope to see more of these corps in future contests. Competition among these five corps could be tremendous if each would try to outshine the others.

The HI-YU contest in West Seattle, sponsored by the merchants, was the biggest of the season. Actually ten corps were present but only seven competed. The missing units were the Black Hawks who wished they had competed, the new Sedro Wooley outfit, and the Buddhist Boy Scouts who may compete pext year. The Pasco Colum-

bians surprised all by attending. It appears that the boys, on their own, voted to come to Seattle to try to avenge the previous week's loss. Their performance was very smooth and they chalked up the highest score of the evening, seniors or juniors. The Hurricanes won easily, their first Hi-Yu win in nine years. The V.F.W. Bremerton Grenadiers played well together until concert but still managed to take second. The Blue Knights, three-time winners of the Hi-Yu, placed third. The Renton Eagles performed a simple drill and played older music; they placed fourth. The Shamrocks fell sharply in their drill and horn playing and took third in the juniors.

Occasionally there will be some incident during competition that stands out in a person's mind. Such an incident occurred during the last show. To me and many others it reached a real low. During the Thunderbird concert, rather loud boo-ing was heard, even on the field. Why should I get excited about this boo-ing ? This particular bit of boo-ing was directed at young boys and girls -- by adults! I hope we

never hear it again.

Reflection about the contests: In practically all drum lines one or two men are flashier than the others and many ticks are given on non-uniformity . . . Some corps seem to be standing still. They sound nearly the same this year as they did three years ago . . . Corps are not building up their horn lines to play many part harmony . . . all buglers in any one corps do not carry, hold, or bring their horns up and down alike . . . All corps members do not pivot alike in marching . . . The audience likes a good "show" the corps should try to please the people at least as much as they try to please themselves, and the judges.

The PASCO COLUMBIANS have also been go-go corps this year. Manager Earl Halverson phoned me an activity report recently. The corps performed a 15 minute concert for 3,000 at the N.W. Square Dancers Convention and also led the promenade. Before 2,500 Rainbow girls they put on a half-hour show. A three-quarter hour exhibition and jam session was given the area Legionnaires. A concert was played for 800 fire chiefs at their convention. At the Kiwanis Funday in Walla Walla, before a crowd of 5,000, the Columbians put on their competition drill. They attended the Kennewick Kiddies parade, Toppennish Indian Pow Wow parade, Tri City -Wenatchee play off baseball game, Ben Sniper Day parade, Seattle Seafair and Hi-Yu parade. (Please don't anyone ask me what Hi-Yu stands for). Numerous firsts and a couple of second prizes in parades were won. This corps is the pace setter for the juniors in this state.

The BLUE ANGELS of Seattle, a new corps which could develop into the largest junior corps in the state, is managed by Frank Sousa of the Hurricanes. Probable instructors are Warren Ceely and John Broderick. The corps is sponsored by the A.L. Post 235 of Riverton Heights and by McMicken Heights Community Club. The corps has their drums but is shy on bugles. They have many horn players tobe. Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Warn of the Warn Mfg. Co. donated \$300.00 for instruments with no strings attached. Bob Broten, for-merly with the Shamrocks will be the lead

drummer. Mike Bice will be publicity man Thanks to Mike for all this infor and lo the picture of your Hurricanes. The aga limits for the Blue Angels will be 12 to 21. The very best of luck to you, Blue

The BUDDHIST BOY SCOUTS of Seattle, are progressing to a point where the should seriously consider competition gain. This corps received a drum acore of 6 (from me, their instructor) last year and lost a little confidence. After a year of fairly good practice I would guest the drum score to be around a 12, on of twenty. Next year it should be higher We hope to see you out there. The corps has attended numerous parades this year and won several prizes; they look better with each turnout.

The BREMERTON GRENADIERS look improved over last year, but their concert number could use more snap and schmaltz Drummers are more uniform now. Hope to see more of you. Newly appointed Drum Corps Commission chief is Jack Bradshaw, Jack has had many years of corps experience and should provide a good Pageant of Drums show next year, in Aberdeen. Now is the time, Jack, to begin planning for the show. With only one V.F.W. senior corps in the state the concentration should be on the juniors. There should be 6 or 7 units by next July. Invite them all. They could make the individual and corps contests real successful and you and the V.F.W. would do the boys and girls a world of good.

At this printing the state A.L. convention will be history by three weeks. Congratulations to all of the winners. The competition season will not be finished, however, until the end of August. The Hurr cane's contest at the C.Y.O. Stadium should be the year's biggest. Fourteen corps have been invited and 8 to 10 may appear. Flags will be presented to the senior and junior corps which shall have amassed most points during the season . . . Notes in passing: We all hope that Ron Stockton does not keep his promise that the Blue Knights will compete only at the State convention in '62 . . . That the Thunderbirds, and any other corps, will not be learning their drill one week before State convention, again . . . A thousand thanks to George Upton of California for spending the hours with the Hurricanes and Thunderbirds. George is a grand drum corps man and has offered many, many helpful suggestions. Wish he lived here . . . I would like to continue to wring out my favorite phrase, A contest is ONLY a contest!

It appears that a good number of Wash-drum corps people will visit Denver for the Nationals. I am sure that this visit will cause many changes and improvements to be made for 1962 and on, in Wash. corps. I will make the A.L. convention this year but not the V.F.W., and I hope to meet old friends and make new ones. In closing, the very best of luck to all corps and members, everywhere.
