The voice of the drum corps

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The fall meeting of the Washington Drum Corps Association was held in mid-October. One member of the Drum Corps Commission attended. The following managers or representatives of corps were present: Forrest Maxam of Everett, Dean Grant of the Hurricanes, Al Wittman of the Shamrocks, Louis Hitchcock of the Black Hawks, Lyle Popple of the Fighting Falcons, Frank Sousa of the Blue Angels, Dick Mulholland of Sedro Wooley, Rod Stubbs of the Thunderbirds, and Earl Halverson of the Tri-Cities Columbians. The elected officers for the '62 season are John Broderick, president; Ron Stockton, vice-president; Al Wittman, secretary; Rod Stubbs and Warren Ceely were elected to the executive board.

Jack Bradshaw, V.F.W. drum corps chairman for 1962 gave a talk on the '62 state contest and the 1963 V.F.W. NAT'L plans. The A.L. corps were asked to become switch corps and participate in some V.F.W. activity. Especially Mr. Bradshaw would like to see a Washington corps made up of the members of all corps to represent Washington in the Nationals. The corps agreed to discuss this suggestion. The Washington V.F.W. will attempt to raise funds and invite all of the state junior corps to the '62 state contest . . . Dean Grant gave an impassioned speech on judging in the state A. L. contests. The Commission offered some excuse blaming lack of funds for judges . . Jack Avery asked that judges be provided who know drum and bugle corps work . . . Jack Morrison asked that the A. L. individual contest be held on the day preceding the parade, practice, and competition day. John Anderson suggested that each corps that does not enter an individual in the bugle and drum class be penalized one point in the corps competition, one point per class . . . Earl Halverson gave a fine speech praising the eastern and midwestern corps. Earl was most complimentary, and gave a rundown on various scores and judges remarks from Denver. He said his boys are working hard now and the older ones who were going to leave the corps are now working harder than ever. Earl told of a very clever money raising scheme that they had used. Each boy was put on a BLOCK (during an Eagles picnic) and the boys were AUCTIONED OFF for one day's work to the highest bidder. Bids ranged from 5 to 52 dollars; the corps funds swelled some eight hundred dollars ... Bob Morrison gave a speech concerning a big Washington corps for the coming nationals in Las Vegas and Seattle. Bob asked all of the men to think about it, stating that this may be the one chance for all to try to approach the big boys. Bob Gaines, Louis Hitchcock, Jack Morrison, and Bob Powers all voiced strong support. We will hear more on this in the near future.

Mike Bice sends the following news of the SEATTLE HURRICANES. "Next year promises to be a big one and the corps has made many changes, both in music and drill. The tenor drummers will use regular snare drum sticks and will play regular snae rudiments. The drum line will be held down to three snares and three tenors and two bass drums. At the executive board meeting Post #11 on October 19, John Broderick, past manager and A.L. state drum champion was appointed drum instructor to succeed Dick Wilson who has retired . . . Gordy Gould who was absent from the ranks last year will be back as Drum Major next year, along with Bob Ackland. At present the Hurricanes have .23 horns on the roster and are shooting for 30. They will have an entirely new concert and many new numbers are being written. The color guard will have a drill designed after the eastern style and promises to be terrific . . . The Hurricanes intend to present another field competition in '62 and are definitely going to be in the V.F.W. NATIONAL in SEATTLE in '63.

Ed Adrian sends the following news of the EVERETT BLUE KNIGHTS. Rehearsals are a little slow but the old standbys are pushing hard with plans for the next year. They are calling all members to rehearse NOW when you really build the corps. A drum instructor is being hired, maybe Jack Potter, maybe Bob Ackland, both well qualified. Three turnouts have been made thus far this fall; Lake Stevens, Granite Falls, and Everett halftime shows. A visit to the Marysville A.L. helped promote a turkey shoot. The Everett corpsmen, again, want to thank all of the pro-Football game promoters for the halftime drum corps shows. They suggest that all of us drop a line and express appreciation.

Al Wittman of the SEATTLE SHAMROCKS announces some good news for his corps. They are now sponsored by the Seattle Forresters. This is truly wonderful news for the hard working boys who attend all competitions and parades and take victory or defeat like gentlemen. New drums and horns are going to make a big difference. 


