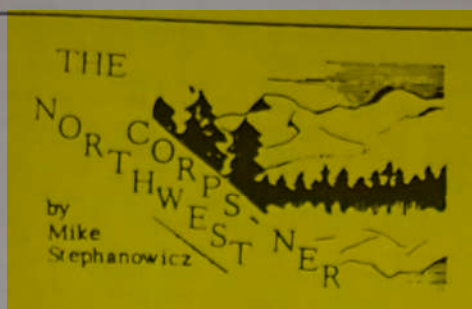

I have learned just this week that JACK BRADSHAW from Seattle has been appointed Drum Corps Chairman, to handle activities prior to TONY SCHLECHTA's arrival in August. Mr. Bradshaw's address is 8894 42nd AVE., S.W., SEATTLE, WASH. Jack will happily answer inquiries from managers, directors, and corps-people about practise fields, busses, judges, miles to travel, costs, etc., etc. For HOUSING information, corps may write to KURT KALSTROM at V.F.W. HEAD-QUARTERS, 400 BOREN AVE., SEATTLE, WASH.

One of the current question marks concerns the competition field. The Sicks Baseball Stadium has been contracted for. But, the Wash. State Drum and Bugle Corps Assoc. has gone on record opposing this site. Attempts are being made to obtain the football stadium on the World's Fair Grounds. This stadium is considered to have one of the finest marching turfs on the coast, hard-packed turf. Written support for the World's Fair Stadium would be very much appreciated from all interested corps and corps members. Please write your views to JACK BRADSHAW or KURT KARLSTROM, above; they are in positions to act. Jack is trying, Kurt must be persuaded.

This writer is currently badgering Tony Schlechta and Jack Bradshaw to obtain the best of experienced and competent judges for the show. I hereby appeal to the big-time judges throughout the East and Midwest to consider the trip to Seattle. It will be a big junior show and the young people deserve the best for those national titles.

To the numerous people who asked me about Seattle's attractions when I was in Minneapolis: The World's Fair area has been renamed Seattle Center, I think. About 85% of the buildings remain intact, all will contain some kind of exhibits, Space Needle remains forever and is out of this world, Monorail is running, Science Buildings and shows intact, Food Circus expanded to 3 stories with the Bubbleator as an elevator, a new big amusement center will be complete by July, lots of fresh and salt water, mountains, high speed ferry boats, The Missouri is still here, skiing will be finished in July. If the competition site can be changed to the World's Fair grounds, it should be a ball - for all. IT'S FESTIVAL TIME IN THE CAROLINAS - Spring has sprung and the warm temperatures are back again. It's the time of the year when the annual Festivals and their parades come back into the spotlight.

AZALEA FESTIVAL - Wilmington, North Carolina - April 6th - here is a beautiful parade of flowers, floats, lovely girls and Bands galore. In fact, there are so many Bands wanting to participate in this Festival Parade that the committee has to run a "PARADE OF MUSIC" two hours prior to the FESTIVAL PARADE to get all the bands in that could not be included in the regular parade. To top this off, the Parade committee does not give a band one cent of expense money. Why should they when they have an overflow of FREE bands available. This hurts many outfits who want to be in this parade but cannot get any expense money.

IRIS FESTIVAL - Sumter, South Carolina - May 9th - here again is another fine parade with many bands, floats, girls, and flowers to show off the beauty of the Carolinas in the Spring. This parade does give the bands a mileage rate for transportation and free drinks afterwards so it does make

it well worth some consideration.

SUN FUN FESTIVAL - Myrtle Beach, South Carolina - June 6th & 7th - now the coastal section of South Carolina comes forth with two parades that again feature Carolina Bathing Beauties, floats, and more Bands. This Festival schedules two parades - one in Ocean Drive Beach on Thursday and then the big Sun Fun Festival Parade in Myrtle Beach on Friday. The Sun Fun Festival parade is a contest for the bands and prizes are offered for the best parade units. That morning, prior to the parade, a Band Concert Contest is put on at the Pavilion Deck on the Ocean Front. (WHY NOT AN M & M Contest?) All in all, this one is good for the musicians.

EASTERN CAROLINA BAND FESTIVAL - Bennettsville, South Carolina - Date? - now we are getting somewhere as the Rotary Club of Bennettsville, S.C. wants to stage a springtime M & M contest. A "feeler" has been sent out to all S.C. Bands and after a summary can be made of the interest in this event, a date will be set.

Summer brings many other FESTIVAL PARADES into the Carolinas as many Tobacco, Cotton, Watermelon, Strawberry Festival events take place.

I hope you have noticed that there is a lot of interest in music in this area but DRUM CORPS have not got in on this interest as yet. Yours truly and several others keep pushing the CORPS-INTEREST-ISSUE every chance we get but it is rough when there is so few corps to present for public consideration. We have three bands in S.C. that are strictly on a CORPS-KICK and they are well received. They are the Barnwell Scarlet Knights, the Mullins Auctioneers and the Loris Lion's. These high school outfits are all instructed by men who believe 100% in drum corps and what they can do.

The Loris Marching Lions' Band is directed by Yours Truly and we are thrilled to pieces with the invitation we have to appear in Carnegie Hall on May 18th. This is a golden opportunity to show you northern friends that the Southland might not be full of Drum and Bugle Corps but we do have Drum Corps at heart and that we honor and respect Drum Corps by putting our high school band on the same kick as the fine northern corps present. The Loris Lion's have a ten girl guard, six percussion, and forty-one horns. They will play three special corps arrangements in Carnegie Hall. Their uniforms are strictly corps-styled including white satin blouses, white ten gallon cowboy hats and royal blue trousers. The guard wears the traditional kick pleat color guard skirt.

On April 26th, we shall present "The Premiere Performance of the Loris Marching Lion's Band in Carnegie Hall, N.Y.C." in the Myrtle Beach Pavilion. Featured will be performances by the Monroe, Georgia All Girl Drum and Bugle Corps as well as the Loris Lion's Band and Drill Color Guards.

The Orlando Golden Jets Drum and Bugle Corps has just recently organized. Bill Tisdell is our Commanding Officer and is known as Captain of the corps.

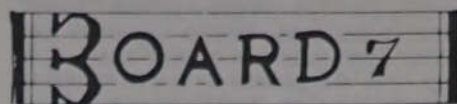
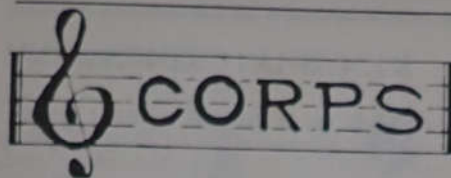
