

Roseburg, Ore. KNIGHTS OF PYTHIAS working on new music and drill. This parade and exhibition corps should join in competition . . . Portland AIR NATIONAL GUARD, 28 total, has not been seen in the Wash, area. Would like to see them join the senior contest circuit . . . the Astoria MARINERS, top Oregon junior corps at the NORTH-CHAMPIONSHIPS, continues to improve. Lots of desire and spirit in this corps. Could get lots of training from the Pendleton senior corps. Keep working manager LEE ALLEN. . . The Salem FLAMINGOS are playing "Blue Moon", "Never on Sunday", and "Rock Around The Clock", plus others. They recently welcomed the Natl. President of the AL Auxiliary, at Portland. Seattle, Portland, and Spokane had the

pleasure of observing and participating in drum clinics by FRANK ARESENAULT of Ludwig Drum Co. Frank conducts an excellent instruction and talk session. His demonstrations are terrific. Apparently, onehanded drumming becoming very popular, and finer drumming for the jazz inclined, also flammed rolls, one-hand 1/16th singles, 6-stroke rolls, 1/32nd singles, drag-adiddles, etc. And, herein is a puzzling thing to me. I love and defend the original "26" with the old timers, and then I also love the new stuff. I have read many articles about: don't add more rudiments to the list, don't pamper every drummer's pet little patterns and sticking, don't change things, etc. etc. THEN, I purchase and see music written by the nations best, I hear Arsenault, I get the word from Del Blake about all the new ideas he learned at the Archer-Epler contest this year (he took the junior drum title), I witness top individuals at nationals, I hear records by the best in the world - and everything is LOADED with new ideas, new patterns, new sticking, and new rhythms. From my experience with students and myself, you must progress and learn the new AND know the old, or you're dead. I think I am convinced now that the standard "26" rudiments are the Arithmetic of drumming - then there is Algebra, and Trig, Analytic Geom., Calculus, etc. I truly wish that some of the new becomes standardized, formally. Then we, out in the drum corps wilds, could learn of it without having to travel and see. I often wonder what men like Bruce and Emmett, Strube, Ashworth,
