SENIOR SHOW NON - V.F.W. TITLE ? ??

Locally there is much unhappiness over lack of a senior contest at the National V.F.W. in Seattle. The Wash. State Drum Corps Assoc. asked me to write to TONY SCHLECTA, Request is for a senior contest, NON-V.F.W. TITLE. Purpose is to inspire western corps for the contest . . . to use nationally famed judges . . . receive some truly indicative scores . . . play in front of a nice size audience . . . spur themselves to higher goals for performing in front of some of the nation's famous junior corps. It is a great idea and we hope that the V.F.W. considers it seriously. Cost to the V.F.W.? Some time and work.

Washington, Oregon, and California corps all working hard. DUANE ANDREWS, music director of the SHAMROCKS, has provided them with all new music. Duane is gaining tremendous respect for his drum corps musicianship. The Shamrocks are turning out with 40-44 horns at rehearsals. Duane is also music director for the West Seattle TOREADORS. Only 10-15 horns, but building and working. LORIN GRINOLDS, costate champ junior drummer, is teaching drums. I think it's wonderful to use junior drummers for instructors. It's good experience and they are often more up-todate. . . . The BHUDDIST BOY SCOUTS are working on Class A ERNIE CARROLL arrangements. They tell me many high notes are being tried. SCOTT OKI, one of the top Bhuddist drummers, will be teaching the Seattle SHRINERS drummers The Seattle THUNDERBIRDS are working with some 35-40 horns on Carroll and JACK AVERY arrangements. Carroll's drum parts are being altered only slightly, rhy-thms unchanged. The boys have started on some LARRY McCORMICK (CAVALIER instructor) street beats. I think I should say street beauts. Am trying them and there are some mean measures, but just wonder-

ful. Very nice drum parts.

Seattle HURRICANES doing fine with 25 horn line, but are hurt by the no senior show on drummers. Two top senior drummers may not sign up now. Corps is doing well, however . . . Everett BLUE KNIGHTS are hurt by senior cancellation also. The V.F.W. sponsor may drop money help now. . . Portland LEATHERNECKS VERY unhappy, 1 am told. Seems that Washington contests will not allow their junior tiptop soprano horn player to compete with the senior corps. The Leathernecks who are shooting for 27 horns, have 25 . . . PHIL YORK now manages the Portland HAWKS. Portland Police V.F.W. is the sponsor and the corps boasts 27 boys. READER is the music director and STELL is horn instructor . . . don't know about drum man. Best of luck, Phil.
