

Due to circumstances beyond our control, it has become necessary to change the format of the National contests slightly to meet these conditions.

Due notice is hereby given, that the Drill Team contests originally slated for Tuesday August 17th, will be moved up to Monday, August 16th.

Corps Inspection, Individuals and Quartets, Color Guards originally slated for Monday, August 16th, will be on Tuesday August 17th.

Unattached Color Guards, solely entered in that contest may be required to appear on Monday the 16th, as well as Individuals in the Bugles and Drum contest - the number of entries will determine the order of appearance at the representatives meetings which remain the same as stated in the rules.

Soldiers Field will be the site of the Million Dollar Pageant of Drums - all other contests and corps prelim's will take place in Hansen Park Stadium, located on the Northwest Side of Chicago and it is hoped that Grant Park Band shell will be available for the Band contests. This has not been confirmed at this date.

In addition to the above facilities, the Prosser Vocational School at Hansen Park will have available rooms for changing purposes-practice fields surrounding this school will be available for the units.

Efforts at this time are being made to have the Chicago Board of Education to open up the Prosser High cafeteria to serve lunches, there are other available

quick snack places close by.

# North-West Omnibus

On March 30, Harold Dillon, organizor of the American Legions National contests, was here in Portland. He was selecting the fields, halls, etc. for the Legions various contests to be held during the National convention.

During his tour of Pottland he held a meeting at a local motel with an audience of some corps members from the Portland area, a few instructors, managers, legionaires, and Frank Arsenault.

The meeting itself was a brief summary of the coming Nationals with a question-answer type proceedure. Subjects like how to improve corps, how to gain support, and how to win the battle against the band instructers were also thrown in occasionally.

Mr. Dillon said the corps prelims will be held at West Moreland park on Aug. 22, and the finals the 23 at Multnomah Stadium, both in Portland (official dates and times can be found later in the legions notices).

The contest will probably have a prelim of 20 to 25 corps, mostly from California, Oregon, and Washington. Mr. Dillon said that Garfield, the Hawthorne Muchachos, and the Hawthorne Caballeros are definetyl planning to come, and that a few Midwest corps like the Royal Airs are possibilities.

A few junior corps on the west coast and possibly elsewhere will be disappointed to find that the finals will consist of 5 junior, and 5 senior corps. This will eliminate many western corps from the finals, especially if very many good corps show up from the East and Midwest.

# Midwest Senior Association News

The Midwest will crown its own senior Champion during a 3-day contest weekend Sept. 4, 5 and 6 at Racine's Horlick Field. The first annual championship of the Midwest Senior Drum and bugle corps Association will be decided between the Men of Brass (Skokie & McHenry, Ill.), Kenosha Kingsmen, Boys of '76, Flint Skylarks, Vanguards (St. Claire Shores, Mich.), Hamm's Indians, St. Peter (Minn.) Govenires, Minneapolis Toreadors, Spirit of St. Louis, Maumee Demons, and the Fairborn, Ohio, Golden Lancers.

The new association's flag, a red, white and blue banner with the outlines of member corps' states, will be carried by the winter during the 1966 season. It's hoped the new flag will be ready for the first association contest, the Kingsmen's Concourse of Champions Memorial Day at Kenosha. Host Corps will carry the Association flag during the 1965 season. Plans for the Association championship

contest were completed at Chicago April 10, at the first general membership meeting since the group was formed last Oct. Association shows will be held at Kenosha, Plymouth, Wis., Flint, Minneapolis, St. Peter, Racine, McHenry, Maumee, Dayton, and St. Claire Shores during the summer

The Association's forst major test will be June 5 at Maumee, when the Kingsmen, Men of Brass, Skylarks, and Golden Lancers meet the Pittsburgh Rockets. The following Saturday, June 12, will bring the Lingsmen, M.O.B., Spirit of St. Louis, and Jamms Indians together at the Plymouth Cheese Festival.

Every corps in the Association will see action July 10, with the Skylark's contest in Flint and the Toreadors' show in Minn. "It looks as though the MSA's first season will be a big success," said Chairman "Pep" Steed (Men of Brass).
