#### IN APPRECIATION

We take this opportunity to thank the audience, the participating corps and individuals, parents, sponsors, advertisers and the many people who have supported this competition and assisted in making it a reality.

This event was first held at the Greenwood Boys Club with Individuals Competitions only. Members of the following corps competed; HURRICANES, Seattle; BLUE KNIGHTS, Everett; GRENADIERS, Bremerton; THUNDER-BIRDS, Seattle; COLUMBIANS, Pasco. Many of the competing groups were not even founded or were inactive at that time. The next two years the event was held at Sand Point and grew steadily in size and Corps Competition was inaugurated. With the appearance of the VERNON GIRLS TRUMPET BAND from British Columbia at the third event, it acquired International flavor. Last years Competition was held at the Masonic Temple and representation from Canada and Oregon increased.

This year five entries were received from THE CORPS OF THE NORTH, Fairbanks, Alaska. We sincerely regret that the recent earthquake in Alaska curtailed these plans and also their plans to compete at Cleveland and New York.

This years NORTHWEST CHAMPIONSHIPS COMPETITION is not only International but represents the largest regional effort to date. More corps are represented or competing than there were at last summers VFW National "PAGEANT of DRUMS". This shows the virility of local Drum & Bugle Corps activity and is an auspicious harbinger of the future.

The THUNDERBIRDS DRUM AND BUGLE CORPS was organized with a nucleus of 36 boys with some beat up horns and drums at the Greenwood Boys Club in the spring of 1958 with Jack Avery as Director.

Under the successive Business Managers, Jack Farmer, Tom Leonard, Rob Stubbs, Ed Grinolds and now John O'Neal, Jack Avery has remained as Director and has contributed to the growth of the corps.

The corps has retained the original concept of being a family activity group and relys on the parents furnishing automobile transportation for the corps members to the numerous practices, turnouts and competitions during the year.

A very active schedule has been maintained since the formation of the corps. Last year the corps made 58 appearances without counting the cadet corps appearances, had over 180 hours of practices plus paper drives, parents and special meetings and dances. Travel in excess of 3,000 miles per family would be a reasonable approximation.

During 1962 65 appearances were made. The corps log of activities is voluminous to the point of being a statisticians paradise.

The numerous trophies, awards and citations won by the group is but a part of the total picture. The corps has been the innovator of new ideas and sets a new level of competitive effort each season. The first with an ALL GIRL COLOR GUARD, with CONTRABASE, with MUSIC READING Corps members, MULTI-PART HARMONY etc. in the Northwest. The corps is proud of the musical ability of the individual corps members.

The Espirit de Corps that marks the group is made up of its fine sportsmanship, decorum and desire to serve.

To provide continuity in maintaining the fine traditions established, the THUNDERBIRD CADET CORPS was started last year as a 'feeder' corps for the THUNDERBIRDS. The group has grown rapidly, both in size and performance to provide the worthy successors to the main corps members as they grow up and out of the corps. This corps will be the one to carry on the identical pattern of excellence within the impending "B" Corps Circuit that the THUNDERBIRDS have established and will maintain in the "A" Corps Circuit.

THE DRUM and BUGLE CORPS of THE BRITISH COLUMBIA REGIMENT (Duke of Connaughts' Own) has not previously competed with other corps.

The Regiment was founded in 1883 and converted to a rifle formation in 1899 from which time the present band has been in existence. Originally using only 'horns' as the early type bugles were known, drums were added during the First World War. The Regiment was converted to tanks during World War Two, but many traditions of the Rifle Brigade were retained, including the Drum and Bugle Corps, regimental rather than armoured corps insignia, the dark green uniforms for the band and the cross-belts worn with dress uniforms by senior ranks.

Although senior competition in the State of Washington is almost a thing of the past, the HURRICANES hope for the development of a Senior Competition Circuit with Corps from Oregon, British Columbia and possibly California. The 1964 season promises important steps towards this development.

### RULES FOR COMPETITION

### ELIGIBILITY

Junior requirements: All members in this class must be under twenty-one (21) years of age. (Note: Any Junior who will attain the age of 21 years after March 18th, 1964 to the date of the contest, will be ruled eligible for the contest.)

All Junior Corps shall compete in one class — Boys, girls or mixed units. No Senior shall be permitted within the contest floor area during this contest.

Senior requirements: All Seniors must be twenty-one (21) years of age or older. All members of a Senior Corps must compete in Senior Categories only.

Each Corps may enter no more than eight (8) contestants in the percussion categories: (2 each) Snare, Tenor, Base Drum and Cymbals. Each Corps may enter no more than twelve (12) contestants in the bugle/bell lyre categories: (2 each) Soprano, French Horn, Baritone, Bass Baritone, Contra-Bass and Glockenspiel.

All competing Corps should hold intra-Corps contests, selecting their top contestants for each category, for this the NORTHWEST CHAMPIONSHIPS COMPETITION.

All contestants from the same Corps must wear the same uniform. All in dress or all in fatigues. Exceptions must be cleared through the Chairman.

There must be at least a minimum of three entries from the total number of registrations received to constitute a contest in each category. If there are less than three entries total in each category, the right is reserved to combine like categories or cancel a category in the interest of time, if necessary. (For example: Total Senior bugle entries received are . . . 3 soprano, 1 French Horn, 2 Baritone, 1 Bass Baritone; The Soprano category constitutes a contest, the remainder may be grouped as one category.)

Deadline for registration will be March 21st, 1964 and entry fee must be paid by that date or a penalty of one (1) point per day will apply on your final score.

Coregory eligibility: Contestants may enter one individual category only, plus one Quartet, one Full Size Corps and one Color Guard.

One (1) Quartet may be entered in each category by each Corps. (Percussion and Bugle.)

No sheet music will be permitted while contestant or contestants are performing.

The sum of one dollar (\$1.00) for each Junior contestant and two dollars (\$2.00) for each Senior contestant must accompany each entry blank for Individual and Quartet contestants ONLY. If a contestant enters more than one category, only one registration fee will be required.

REGISTRATION FORMS WILL BE MAILED PRIOR TO FEBRUARY 1st, 1964!

Any infraction of these rules shall be cause for disqualification, subject to review by three (3) members of the Washington State Drum Corps Association.

#### SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS

#### SNARE DRUM

- 1. "Long Roll" open, close and open. (A perfect long roll is 3 minutes. 1% minutes going in and 1% minutes coming out.)
- 2. Solo of choice 2 to 3 minutes duration.
- 3. Standard Rudiments will govern judging.
- 4. A one point penalty will be assessed for each thirty (30) seconds or fraction thereof, for time over or under.

#### TENOR DRUM

- 1. "Single Stroke Roll" open, close and open.
- 2. Solo of choice 2 to 3 minutes duration.
- 3. Standard rudiments will govern judging. Scotch drumming style will be allowed.
- 4. Tenor Drum may be accompanied by a Spare Drum.
- 5. A one point penalty will be assessed for each thirty (30) seconds or fraction thereof, for time over or under.

#### BASS DRUM AND CYMBALS

- 1. Solo of choice 2 to 3 minutes duration.
- 2. Bass drum and cymbals must be accompanied by a Snare Drum.
- 3. Standard rudiments will govern judging, and Scotch drumming style will be allowed. (applicable to Bass Drum only.)
- 4. A one point penalty will be assessed for each thirty (30) seconds or fraction thereof, for time over or under.

#### PERCUSSION QUARTET

- 1. To be made up of any combination of the percussion instruments, namely: Snare Drum, Tenor Drum, Bass Drum and Cymbals.
- 2. Selection of choice 2 to 3 minutes duration,
- 3. A one point penalty will be assessed for each thirty (30) seconds or fraction thereof, for time over or under.

#### BUGLES

- 1. Play in sequence the following notes and hold for eight (8) beats: "G," "C," "E," "G," and high "C."
- 2. Tattoo.
- 3. Solo of choice 2 to 3 minutes duration.
- 4. A one point penalty will be assessed for each thirty (30) seconds or fraction thereof, for time over or under.

#### GLOCKENSPIEL

- 1. Solo of choice 2 to 3 minutes duration,
- 2. A one point penalty will be assessed for each thirty (30) seconds or fraction thereof, for time over or under,

#### BUGLE QUARTET

- To be made up of any combination of bugle or bell lyre instruments, namely: Soprano Bugle, French Horn Bugle, Baritone Bugle, Contra Bass Bugle and Glockenspiel.
- 2. Selection of choice 2 to 3 minutes duration.
- 3. A one point penalty will be assessed for each thirty (30) seconds or fraction thereof, for time over or under.

#### CORPS DRILL CONTEST

- Corps Drill applies to a Corps unit consisting of 16 or more playing members. A Color Guard may accompany the Corps. Size of drill
  area is 82' x 190'. Corps will enter from the South end of the Arena and exit from the North end of the Arena. Corps may execute
  additional maneuvers after entering the contest area if they wish to do so.
- 2. Selections of choice 6 to 8 minutes duration.
- 3. A one point penalty will be assessed for each thirty (30) seconds or fraction thereof, for time over or under.
- 4. Timing will begin with the first note of music or first step over competition sidelines and end with the last step out of competition area.
- Corps will be judged on bugling, dramming and general effects. Military bearing will be judged from entrance to designated concert number and off concert number to exit. The judge must be notified in advance, which is the concert number.

#### COLOR GUARD CONTEST

- 1. Shall consist of from five (5) to twenty (20) Corps members.
- 2. Shall be in the drill area for a duration of 4 to 6 minutes. Size of drill area is 32° x 190°,
- 3. Timing for the unit will start with the first step of a member of the Guard proper over the starting line, and end with the last step over the finishing line.
- 4. Color Guard may be accompanied by a drum beat.
- 5. Required maneuvers in any order:
  - a. Salute while marching.
  - b. Present and post all colors.
  - c. Retrieve colors within 60 seconds of posting National Colors.
  - d. Execute any other maneuvers as part of performance.
- 6. A one point penalty will be assessed for each thirty (30) seconds or fraction thereof, for time over or under.

#### PENALTIES

- Applies to all participants.
- 2. Late reporting one (1) full point,
- 3. Coaching or sideline directing five (5) full points.
- 4. Over or under time one (1) full point for each thirty (30) seconds or fraction thereof.
- 5. Practicing in contest area two (2) full points.
- 6. Out of uniform one (1) full point. This penalty pertains to members of a Corps not wearing the same uniform.
- 7. One (1) full point per day for registrations received after the postmark date of March 21st, 1964.

#### AWARDS

- 1. Medals will be awarded all first, second and third place Individuals winners.
- 2. Medals will be awarded individual members of all first place Quartets.
- 3. One trophy each will be awarded the winning Color Guard Junior and Senior.
- 4. One trophy will be awarded the winning Corps in the Corps Drill Contest.

Contestants are graded in each of the following categories, receiving one-tenth of a point penalty for each error detected by the Judges:

GENERAL APPEARANCE
POSITION AND HANDLING OF INSTRUMENTS
MILITARY BEARING
EXECUTION
EXPRESSION
RHYTHM
QUALITY OF SELECTION

# COLOR GUARD CONTEST

Color Guards are Judged in two categories - Execution and General Effect.

Execution includes the following, under which tenth of a point penalties are assessed for each error detected:

DIGNITY AND MILITARY BEARING
MARCHING AND MANEUVERING
SALUTES
PRESENTATION AND POSTING OF COLORS
RETRIEVING OF COLORS

FLAG ETIQUETTE - a two point penalty is given for each infraction of flag etiquette.

General Effect means the overall appeal of the show presented. In this category the Judge gives the unit credit for what they do, rather than assess penalties for errors. Under this category the Judge grades the following:

REPERTOIRE EFFICIENCY TECHNIQUE SHOWMANSHIP

# CORPS DRILL CONTEST

In the Drill Contest the Drums and Bugles are Judged in the same categories as outlined under Individual and Quartet Contests and, in addition, they are given credit for their performance in the General Effect caption, as explained under the Color Guard Contest.



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
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
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
