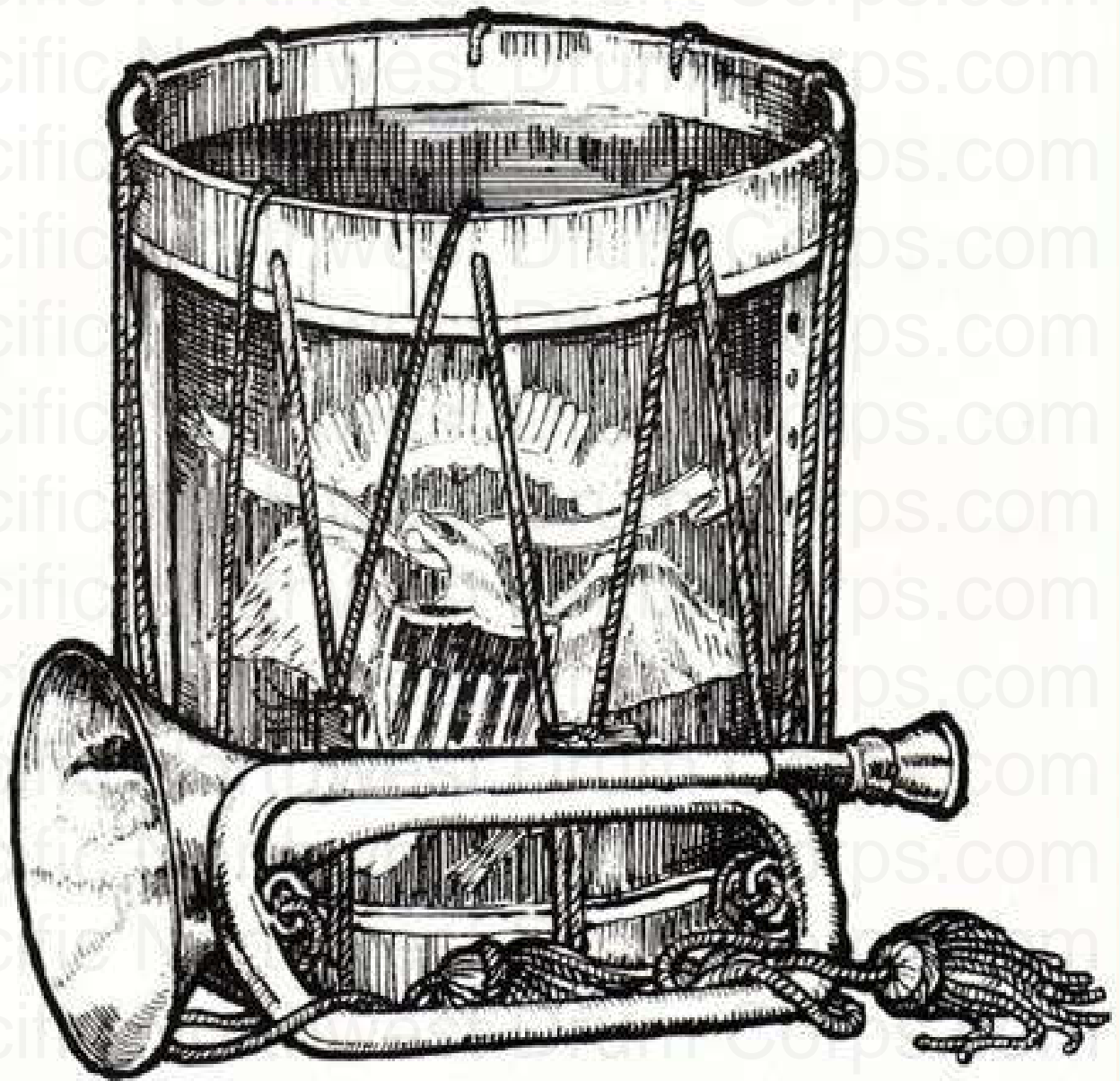

Trophies

The winning Junior "A" Corps will receive the Thunderbirds' perpetual trophy initiated last year. The trophy, carved especially for the occasion by John Hoffstater of Bainbridge Island, was awarded to the Shamrocks of Seattle last year.

A second trophy, also perpetual in nature, will be awarded to the winning Drum Major. The award was started last year by Jerry Logan, current drum major of the Thunderbirds. Jerry's dedication to Thunderbirds' activities, and to drum and bugle corps in general, is an outstanding example of leadership and sincere interest and devotion.

Judges

Judging is performed by the All American Association of Contest Judges. Bob Aklin is the Chief Judge. The Association holds a judges clinic regularly consisting of many prominent Drum and Bugle Corps and Band Association members from Washington State. The purpose of this clinic is to update judging procedures and provide the best judges possible for Corps competitions throughout the area. The judges you see on the floor are all approved by the Association.

SALEM, OREGON



The Flamingos Junior Drum and Bugle Corps begin their fifth year of this activity under the sponsorship of the Breakfast Optimist Club of Salem, the Salem B.P.O.E. No. 336 and the Flamingo Drum and Bugle Corps Parents Club. They have grown over the past four years from 19 to 33 boys and 37 girls with each year being more creditable in achievements and performance. The young people, ranging in age from 10 to 18 years, have worked hard in their program: rehearsing performances and fund raising campaigns to assist in their needs. Their future hopes are for continued growth as representatives of their community.

The Corps traveled over 3,000 miles this past year with two proud appearances in Canada along with many throughout Oregon and Washington. They were the only unit carrying the stars and stripes in the Nanaimo, B.C., Vancouver Island parade placing 2nd in overall marching and music units. Corps member appreciation for the fine hospitality given by the Nanaimo townspeople proved most rewarding for all concerned. They have standing invitations for repeat performances this year, with plans to return to Nanaimo in May and August of this year.

The Corps recently took first place honors as a "B" corps at Opti-Rama in Salem and are working hard to progress to an "A" category corps.

The Flamingo Color Guard was formed in July of 1963 with 11 girls. Since then the guard has grown to 17 girls. They have been a competing guard since January of 1964,

improving steadily until the present time. They placed second in Oregon State Legion Competition in 1966 and third at Drumkhana also in 1966. In parade competitions they were first place color guard in the Hillsboro "Happy Days" parade and at Waldport "Beachcomber Days" parade. Color guard commander is Shannon Graves and color captain is Sybil Snook.

Corps sponsors annual Opti-Rama Drum Corps Standstill Competition in Salem, Oregon. It is the first Northwest Competition held each year, scheduled in 1968 for January 20.

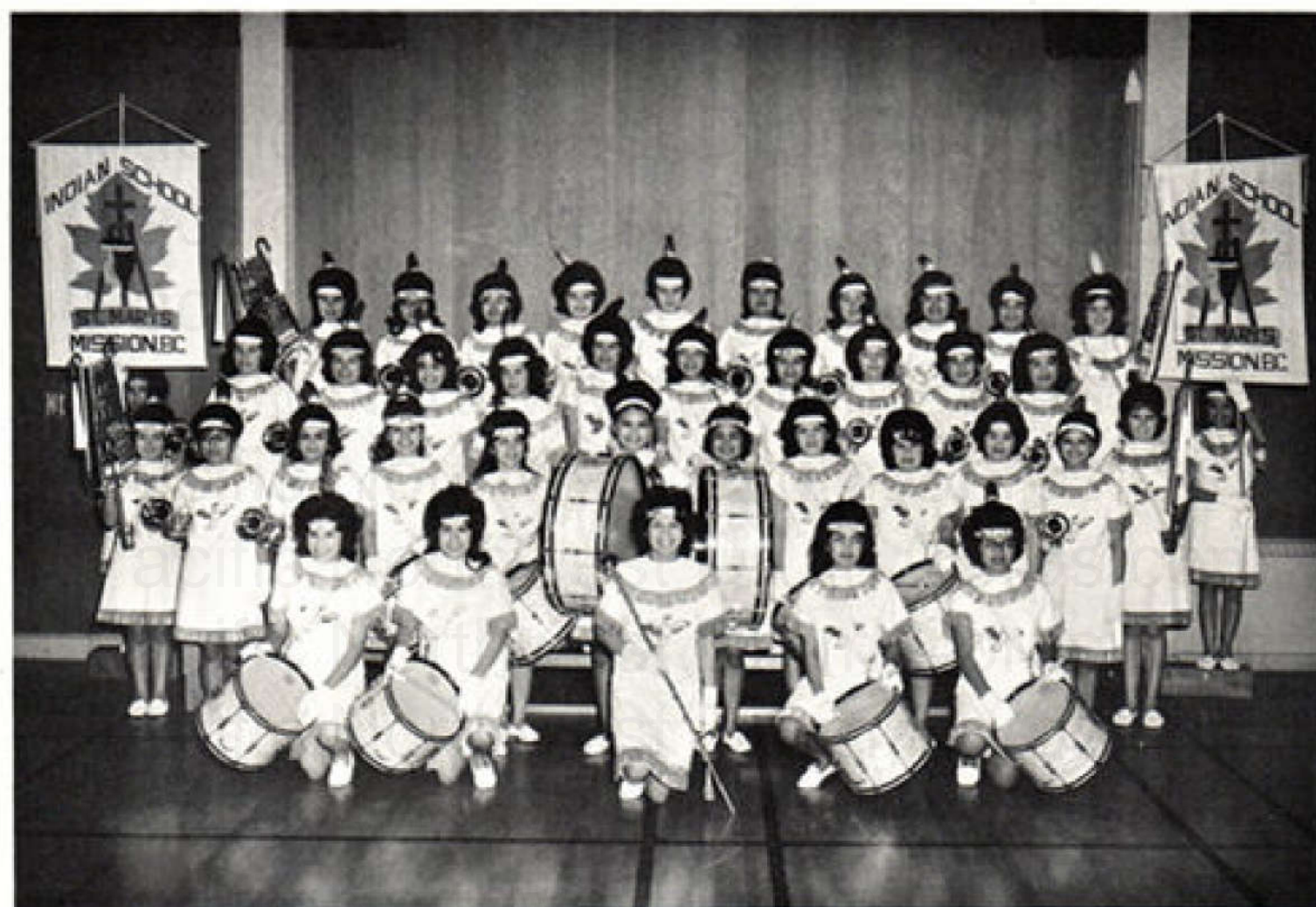

It has grown over the years from a small frame structure to a very large and modern complex surrounded by graceful lawns and large athletic fields. It overlooks the broad and quiet Fraser River.

The Girls' Drum and Bugle Corps was formed in 1962. The fact that it is composed entirely of Indian maidens of high school age seems to have lent it a certain charm. The girls have been exceptionally well received wherever they

have performed.

The band accepts many invitations each year and as a result has travelled extensively in the Province of British Columbia.

The Corps is under the direction of Sergeant F. Dunning who is a member of the Regimental Band stationed at Chilliwack, B.C. He is assisted by Miss Joan McGeragle. Miss Virginia Joe of the Squamish Indian Tribe has led the band since its inception.

United States Air Force Academy



Since its inception in June of 1959 with 10 drummers and 18 buglers, the Corps has grown into a 48-man unit. It is composed of 36 buglers and 12 drummers, and is the only official Drum Corps in the United States Air Force.

As a musical representative of the Air Force and the Air Force Academy, the Corps has performed throughout the United States, participating in parades and ceremonies. The Corps has won national acclaim for its field shows. These stirring exhibitions of marching precision and musical skill have thrilled millions who have seen the Corps perform at fairs, community celebrations, and other public events. During the half-times at the Falcon football games, their field shows have appeared on network TV, through the facilities of CBS.

A rigid schedule at the Academy keeps the group from suffering from inactivity. Noon formations and guest appearances are but a few of the many assignments levied upon the Corps. Formal parades, retreats, preparatory school drills, and many hours of practice keep the unit busy.

Even the summer "vacation months" provide no let-up. If anything, they bring a heavier workload. With the arrival of the new class of basic cadets each June, buglers and drummers turn out at 5:00 a.m. to play for breakfast formations. As the basics pace through morning and afternoon drill sessions, they are "serenaded" by the corps.

Major Herman Vincent, Commander-Conductor of the Academy Band, is Commander of the Drum and Bugle Corps; Master Sergeant Harvey Wolf, NCOIC; Music Supervisor, Staff Sergeant Kieth Markey; Marching Maneuvering Supervisor A/2C James Wade; and Percussion Supervisor, Staff Sergeant Robert Wilson provide leadership for the unit's polished military and musical performances.

Just a few of the corp's appearances include the National Rifle and Pistol Championships at Camp Perry, Ohio; the Peace Bowl in Nebraska; the Missile Bowl in Florida; the 'Gator in Florida; the Saint Paul Winter Carnival in Minnesota; the Chemical Valley Festival in Sarnia, Ontario (Canada); and the Presidential Inauguration Parade in Washington, D.C.

Cascade Cadets

SEATTLE, WASHINGTON

The Cadets Corps was organized at Wilson Jr. High during the 1963-64 school term, under the direction of Rod Stubbs (organizer and guard instructor), Alvin Larkin (music instructor), and Jack Avery (director and instrumental instructor).

The present Corps membership is represented by 98% of its members consisting of junior high students. Ten members have completed three years of corps work. Other corpsmen are evenly divided who are in their 1st or 2nd season of experience.

During the past years the Corps has appeared in Washington, Oregon and Canada with two National Competitions to its credit. The Cascade Cadets are presently rated as a "B" Corps, but plans are being made by the membership to change this by winning an "A" corps status in the near future.

Sponsors of the Cascade Cadets are: Wilson Jr. High; Sergeant Fletcher Daniels, VFW Post; Stan Southerland, Jr. Post; American Legion, and Northgate Kiwanis.

The Cascade Cadets Color Guard is the number one guard of the Cascade Cadets Drum & Bugle Corps. All members are junior high school girls with two to three years experience. During the past three years the color guard has consistently placed second, with an occasional third place, in all color guard competitions held.

The number two unit color guard for the Cascade Cadets is the Thunderettes. This group is a feeder group to the advanced guard. Membership consists of seventh grade girls who are in their first season of guard work.
