

ROYAL LANCERS

The Royal Lancers Drum & Bugle Corps Inc. originated in September 1963 and was fully organized by January 1964, under the name "Royal Legion Lancers Drum & Bugle Corps". The corps was incorporated as a non-profit Oregon Educational Institution on June 29, 1967, under the name "Royal Lancers Drum & Bugle Corps Inc."

Since its inception, the corps has won four out of five yearly state competitions in Oregon and many other competitions in the Northwest. In August 1966, they traveled to New Westminster, B.C. where they won the Western Canadian International Championship in the "B" division which placed them into the "A" division of field competition. The move meant tougher competition, but the members were proud to make it into the most difficult division.

The Lancer's main goal is to compete with other corps throughout the Northwest, California and anywhere else in the Nation that funds will allow. They made their first California tour in 1968, where they traveled to learn more about music, marching technique, and to better their corps as a whole. The Lancers placed third in two contests on this tour: one in Anaheim and one in Stockton. This is a good record since it was the first time an Oregon corps has competed in that area where they have a different conception on G.E. and M. & M.

The Royal Lancers had a budget of approximately \$16,000 last year. This money goes for horns, uniforms, drums, flags, rifles, traveling expenses and the many other things that it takes to run a successful drum corps, to make a good representation for the people of Portland and Oregon.
