



The four men met outside Chicago. It was November 1973, and the curtain was closing on a year in which the Patriots had won their second straight Northwest Drum Corps Association championship, captured the Washington Open, VFW and American Legion state crowns, and accepted their second George Washington Honor Medal in the Community Programs Category from the Freedoms Foundation, Inc., of Valley Forge, Pennsylvania.

But drill designer Jan Krueger of Milwaukee, Wis., music arranger Jim Ott of Stockton, Calif., consultant Gary Czapinski of Chicago, and Howard A. Robbins of the Percussion-Naut Patriots were not looking back on these accomplishments.

This was the beginning of the Patriots' 1974 competition drill.

Agreed upon that day was the broad concept of what has become the Patriots' most spectacular and exciting drill in four years as a drum and bugle corps.

The Corps comes off the line in a Bicentennial Salute which features music that has identified the Percussion-Nauts since their purely exhibition days: "Yankee Doodle Dandy," "Chester," "Rally Round the Flag," a simultaneous playing of "Battle Hymn" and "Dixie" in related tempos — a musical recreation of the mood of the Civil War, and then the climax, the presentation of the colors to "Battle Hymn."

This brings on the Patriots' drum line in a field solo, written by drum major Dave Wakeley, which concludes with "Turkey in the Straw" performed on keyboard percussion instruments. Ott's arrangement of Aaron Copland's "Hoedown" leads into his pulsating arrangement of a Maynard Ferguson medley, "Country Roads" and "Give It One."

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
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
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Out of concert is to another Dixie number, the familiar "Way Down Yonder in New Orleans," followed by a drum solo and the exit to a patriotic recap: "Cruel War," "Where Have All the Flowers Gone?" "Blowing in the Wind" and "Battle Hymn."

Lee Shook as horn instructor, assisted by John Baker, handles the 46-member bugle line, while Dick Ivester aided by color guard captains Christy Babbitt and Janice Faulkner, as well as Linda Bostwick of Seattle, handles marching and maneuvering and instructs the 26 girls of the flag line. There are also eight in the rifle line and four members of the basic guard. Adding his expertise in the above areas at times is Robert Spevacek, director of the Vandal Marching Band at the University of Idaho. Robbins and Wakeley, with guest instruction on occasion by Ed Bostwick of Seattle, have shaped this year's 26-member drum line.

The Patriots come into their own "Classic of Champions" show following a series of contests involving nationally ranked corps.


Spokane has seen them several times this year at Expo '74, where they sounded the first musical notes of the official opening last May 4 and have appeared on other occasions. The Percussion-Nauts' other members, the Colonial fife and drum unit, have been frequent performers at Expo, where they serve as Gov. Dan Evans' own official escort for the nation's governors as they participate in the various State Honor Days.

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

STOCKTON COMMODORES DRUM & BUGLE CORPS

The Stockton Commodores Drum & Bugle Corps, Northern California Circuit Champions, and 12th member of Drum Corps International, Inc., in 1973, is the oldest active Northern California Corps. The Corps was organized in 1955, and contained 12 members.

The Corps is now comprised of 58 horns, 24 drums, 28 color guard, 12 rifles, 3 A-Squad, I color guard captain and Tony Schultz as Drum Major. The participants are from all educational, economic and ethnic groups, from San Joaquin, Alameda and Sacramento Counties, with head-quarters in Stockton, California. The Commodores have recently merged with the Royalaires Drum & Bugle Corps of San Leandro (Alameda Co.) California, thereby creating a much larger and competent corps.

Since the Commodores' headquarters are located in Stockton, the inland "Port City" of California, the name Commodores was selected, and a nautical theme was the natural choice.

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THE KNIGHT RAIDERS

The Knight Raiders Drum and Bugle Corps, Inc. was formed in the summer of 1969 to provide interested youth of the Santa Clara Valley with the opportunity to develop a wholesome competitive spirit in music and marching. The Corps is composed of boys and girls from 10 to 21 years of age. The Corps holds membership in both the California Drum and Bugle Corps Circuit and California Color Guard Circuit. In addition to guard shows and circuit competitions the Corps participates in parades and other functions.

The Knight Raiders are currently in their fifth year of Drum and Bugle Corps Circuit competition. During the winter and early spring the Color Guard is active in Guard contests while the Horn and Drum lines are learning the new music. At the conclusion of the Guard season all attention is focused on blending the three groups into one coordinated organization capable of presenting an integrated and smooth-flowing performance on the field, to accomplish this, the Corps employs only the most outstanding and competent instructional staff to inspire and train the members. The Knight Raiders aspire to present a professional appearance.

Corps members are willing and able competitors. Membership is open to interested boys and girls who are good sports and are willing to learn in return for comprehensive training, travel, and the satisfaction of a job well done.

The Corps is sponsored by Veterans of Foreign Wars Mission Santa Clara Post 3982 and a strong Booster Club.

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THE CALGARY CAVALIERS

Calgary, Alberta

The Calgary Cavaliers are in their fourth year as a self-sponsored Drum and Bugle Corps. During its first 3 years the Corps appeared throughout Alberta and the Northwest Circuit as The Red and White Aires all-girl unit. The girls believing in the equal opportunity theory of Women's Lib, decided to increase the Corps to its present strength by allowing boys to join. A change in name and an expanded recruiting drive has produced the Corps you see today . . . 65 boys and girls known as the Cavaliers. The Corps personnel of whom 60% are first year members have practiced long and difficult hours in preparation for their show.

Despite the styalized uniform, the Corps presents musical selections representative of two great yet different cultures . . . the American and the Russian. The Corps enters the field playing "Volga Boatman" and then contrasts the sober tune with "Dixie." The Corps moves to the back field to the American folksong "Shenadoah" and then presents itself with the triumphant conquest. "Midnight In Moscow" is an American jazz number with a Russian flavor and melody.

The last half of the Cavaliers presentation focuses on major conflicts that have involved the two nations. The first part is a musical review of the American Civil War and the finale is composed of excerpts from Tchaikowsky's 1812 Verture.

The Cavaliers' director is Mac Pittman who is assisted by Bud Hulse. On the field the Corps is directed by Drum Major Melody Greig and Guard Captain Kelly Jones.

JUDGING A DRUM AND BUGLE CORPS

As each Corps starts onto the field, they begin with 100 possible points. Those 100 points are divided among the judges as described below. Each error by a Corps detracts from the possible perfect score of 100 at the rate of 0.1 point for each error. The deduction of a point is called a "tick".

MARCHING AND MANEUVERING

M & M is an important area for judging. It is worth 30 of the 100 possible points on the score sheet. Judges watch for uniformity of marching, such as: does everyone stop at the same time, are all feet in the same form of position when halted, is the spacing between members the same and are the squad lines straight.

PENALTIES

A Corps' performance is to last from 11 to 13 minutes for "A" and "B" division Corps, and from 5 to 6 minutes for "C" division Corps. The time begins as a playing member steps onto the field, and runs until the last playing member is off the field—excluding Color Guard personnel. Penalties are assessed for over time or under time. During the drill, each "A" and "B" Corps must be in motion at least 8 minutes of their total time on the field. Flag etiquette is also important and penalties are given for failure to salute at the right time. You will note that no other flag ever flies higher in elevation than the American Flag.

DRUMMING AND BUGLING

Both Drums and Bugles are checked by the judges who are both on the field and in the stands. Each is worth 20 points on the score sheet (total of 40). The music is judged on how it sounds, how the Corps executed each selection and how the playing members show their musical technique. Music difficulty is also considered, and credit is given for expressive changes in style and rhythm.

GENERAL EFFECT

G E receives 30 points on the scoring and is judged in the stands! The whole corps is evaluated for looks, polish, sound and how the audience reacts to the show they are performing. This is a "build up" category, with points being added to a Corps' score. Thus we have accounted for the possible score of 100.

The Cascades Drum and Bugle Corps was organized in June of 1966, and since has grown to a membership of over 90 boys and girls.


Last year competing in the "B" Division they took first in all shows ending the season as "B" Division Champions, This year as an "A" Corps they will be striving for greater heights.

It takes many individuals to provide the management and instruction of such an enthusiastic group of young people, to name a few:

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

The Patriots are seasoned travelers. Some are veterans of the exhibition corps which in the Percussion-Nauts' first ten years made numerous appearances throughout the Pacific Northwest including Canada, toured historic shrines of New England and the East, and performed in six countries of Europe. Since becoming a drum and bugle corps in the 1971 season they have traveled many thousands of miles, criss-crossing the highways of the Northwest, traveling into California and performing at Disneyland, seeing a portion of the old Southwest, and competing in nationally ranked shows in the Midwest and the Great Lakes area.

Their remaining 1974 schedule is to take them as far as New York state.

Percussion-Naut parents who sponsored the corps in 1972 took the first step to meet these growing travel needs, acquiring three used Scenic-cruiser buses. This year they completed their fleet by adding an all-purpose staff car, a minibus, as well as a diesel tractor-drawn mobile kitchen.

Approximately 80 families take active part in Percussion-Naut Patriot projects, and from these families come the drivers, mechanics, chaperones, cooks and nurses who keep the corps and its fleet rolling. Key supervisory positions are held by Mrs. Lowell Brown, president of the sponsoring Percussion-Nauts of Spokane, Inc.; Ron Shaffer, travel director; Mrs. Ben Ruehl, business manager; Wayne Faulkner, fleet maintenance; Ray Crocker, chief driver; Mrs. James Inman, chaperones and kitchen, and a 20-member Board of Trustees.
